We will examine Plato's *Republic*, Aristotle's *Categories*, *Metaphysics* (Books I – IX; XII – XIV), and *Nicomachean Ethics*. Students are expected to write a one-page Response paper each week, and to sumbit on 1000 word paper and a 2000 word research paper at the end.
